Call to Worship – Psalm 95:1-7

As the fountain of all truth, goodness, and beauty, God deserves our trust, honor, and adoration. The call to worship invites us to consider whether we are making God the object of our worship, and stirs us to recenter our lives on him alone.

Oh come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation. Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise. For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods. In his hand are the depths of the earth; the heights of the mountains are his also. The sea is his, for he made it, and his hands formed the dry land. Oh come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker! For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand.

Choir – “Psalm 150”

Throughout Scripture, God’s people have used choirs to lead in worship. King David appointed hundreds of singers to minister musically to the Lord morning and evening (1 Chronicles 23:30). The choir serves in this same spirit today, testifying to God’s eternity, love, and holiness, and stirring our hearts to praise him.

Words of Confession and Praise

Confession means we are completely honest with God and others about our flaws and failures. Instead of hiding in shame or self-defensiveness, we admit our sin, and open ourselves to God's mercy available through Christ alone.

Psalm 103:8-13

The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. He will not always chide, nor will he keep his anger forever. He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities. For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his steadfast love toward those who fear him. As far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us. As a father shows compassion to his children, so the Lord shows compassion to those who fear him.

John 10:27–28 My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. Scripture Reading – Ephesians 6:1-9

Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. “Honor your father and mother” (this is the first commandment with a promise), “that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land. Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord. Bondservants, obey your earthly masters with fear and trembling, with a sincere heart, as you would Christ, not by the way of eye-service, as people-pleasers, but as bondservants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart, rendering service with a good will as to the Lord and not to man, knowing that whatever good anyone does, this he will receive back from the Lord, whether he is a bondservant or is free. Masters, do the same to them, and stop your threatening, knowing that he who is both their Master and yours is in heaven, and that there is no partiality with him.

Sermon: Spirit-Filled Parenting (Ephesians 6:4)

Sin has turned this world into a broken place. But God has a cosmic plan to heal and unite all things in Jesus—"things in heaven and things on earth" (Ephesians 1:10). Christian parents, as Spirit-filled participants in this plan, have a high and sacred calling: to nurture their children in the words and ways of Jesus.

I. Meaning - What does the text say?

A. Audience - "Fathers"

Dads bear the primary responsibility.

B. Negative instruction - "Do not provoke your children to anger"

Authority wrongly used breaks trust and breeds resentment.

C. Positive instruction - "Bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord"

Instead of neglecting or embittering their children, parents should use their influence to nurture their hearts and shape their minds in Jesus' words and ways.

1. "Bring them up" = nurture toward maturity
2. "Discipline" (*paideia*) = life-shaping education (process)
3. "Instruction" (*nouthesia*) = formative instruction (means)
4. "Of the Lord" = the words and ways of King Jesus (goal)

II. Application - How does the text apply?

A. Live the truth you teach (Deut. 6:6-7; 1 Cor. 11:1)

B. Shape their habits, shape their hearts (Prov. 22:6; Ps. 1:1-2; Deut. 5:12)

C. Speak life-giving words (Deut. 6:7; Prov. 10:11; Psalm 78:1-8)

D. Engage their minds with questions and answers (Deut. 6:20-21).

Questions for Discussion and Application

For Everyone

1. How have you experienced either positive or negative examples of discipline and instruction growing up or in your current relationships?
2. If you are a parent or caregiver, how might you evaluate your own approach: are you more prone to provoke frustration or to nurture with patience and godly teaching?
3. Even if you are not actively parenting children now, how might Ephesians 6:4 challenge you in your relationships with younger people or those you influence (managing, mentoring, teaching, coaching)?
4. How can the principle of “discipline and instruction in the Lord” be applied to personal growth or discipleship beyond parenting?
5. What specific steps can you take this week to embody the patience, love, and godly instruction this verse calls for in your closest relationships?
6. How can our church support parents and caregivers in fulfilling this calling well?
7. How does understanding God as a loving Father shape how we think about disciplining and instructing others?

For Parents

1. What is my ultimate goal for my children? (*What kind of person am I hoping they become—spiritually, morally, and relationally?*)
2. By the time they leave home, what do I want them to believe, love, and practice? (*What convictions should anchor them, what affections should drive them, and what habits should shape their daily lives?*)
3. How am I intentionally shaping our family’s rhythms—our schedule, conversations, and use of technology—to move them toward that vision?
4. What do my children currently believe about God, the gospel, and the purpose of life—and how do I know? (*Have I heard it from their own mouths, or am I assuming based on outward behavior?*)
5. What value do my children place on the church, prayer, and Scripture—and what am I doing to help shape that value?

We exist to proclaim the love of Christ in the power of the Spirit for the glory of God.
